Our secretary put in 20 hours a week last year and it will be more this year. Can we expect anyone to volunteer for that kind of a load in the future? We need people ready to take over when Jane can no longer give the time that it takes for the quality newsletter that we now have; and Chris Switzer's Library; and the Wes Mauz Memorial Fund for scholarships, etc., etc.

RMLA has never been a money-making, political organization. We have always been a people orientated organization known for what we do

with and for llamas. If that is still our philosophy, we need our new members to get involved, and we need the members who have not been involved in the past to step to the front of the bus and take the wheel. Some of our older members need to let go of the wheel and remember that while a little back-seat driving will keep us on course, too much back-seat driving will wreck us.

Your officers this year are: Sally German, President-Elect; Dale Pettigrew, Vice-President; Jerry Boudreaux, Treasurer; Judy Lawson, Secretary; and of course myself, your President.

Now, I'm no "Parnelle Jones," but I believe even I can keep our bus between the posts with this crew aboard. Four out of five of us have been on the executive committee before, so I think we have the experience needed for the reconstruction process to take place. We are all taking our jobs very seriously, and we are looking forward to this year. We have asked Kate Booth, an RMLA member who consults and facilitates groups like ours, to volunteer her services and help us get off to a good start.

1990 RMLA CONFERENCE A GREAT SUCCESS!

Conference Report by Jerry Boudreaux,
Treasurer

Thanks to Donna Glode and her committee workers, the September Conference was a smashing success. Charlie has excellent comments and praise in his President's Letter, so I will not be redundant. Much thanks to all who helped--we appreciate you!

Total attendance was 208 people, represented by 190 members, 6 speaker guests, and 12 CSU veterinary student guests. The animal world was represented well by 87 llamas and alpacas. Good turnout!

Eighteen of our members contributed a total of \$630 so that the CSU vet students could attend the seminars. Thanks to all who contributed to this investment in tomorrow's veterinarians.

The conference financial results were very good due to the attendance. Gross income was \$19,494, and expenditures were \$17,230, which results in a net profit of \$2,264. The financial objective of the Board was to obtain a small profit from the conference. This is one of the more difficult areas of responsibility for the Conference Committee, because attendance is tricky to forecast and cost controls are crucial. Obtaining this goal deserves another expression of gratitude to Donna and her group.

The RMLA Foundation received \$14,115 during the conference (\$13,615 from the Fun Action and \$500 from other donations.) The total funds in the Foundation are now approximately \$31,600.

HORSEMEN AND LLAMA OWNERS WORK TOGETHER TO PREVENT CONFLICTS

In Salmon, Idaho this past summer an interesting and promising incident took place concerning llamas and horses/mules. There is a club by the name of "Back Country Horsemen" here, and many of the members were interested in seeing how their animals would react to llamas. They were a little afraid of a "blow-up" on the trail someplace. So that club took it upon themselves to sponsor a "meet the llamas" evening at our fairgrounds.

They used the media of radio, newspaper, and telephone to attract as many people as possible that had horses and mules. They arranged this meeting with the few llama owners in the Salmon area and we all agreed to bring our animals at the appointed day. The Back Country Horsemen group provided ice water and cups to keep the thirsty animal owners happy.

The appointed evening came, and turnout was 6 llamas and around 20 horses and mules. We were instructed to first tie our llamas up along a hitching rack, and the horse and mule

owners rode and led their animals near the llamas. It wasn't long before the horses and mules didn't pay much attention to the "funny looking fuzzy guys." So then we took our llamas into the rodeo grounds and walked around in among the horses and mules. Sometimes the llamas were a bit afraid of the large horses and mules and were not real excited about exchanging nose sniffs. It was a good time for llama folks to talk to horse and mule owners about the llama traits and how they worked on the trail. I had saddles and packs on our two. The rest of the llama owners did not.

We had no choice but to walk through the horses to our rigs. Everyone was watching closely to see what might happen. Nothing did. The horses gave a nicker and paid us no mind.

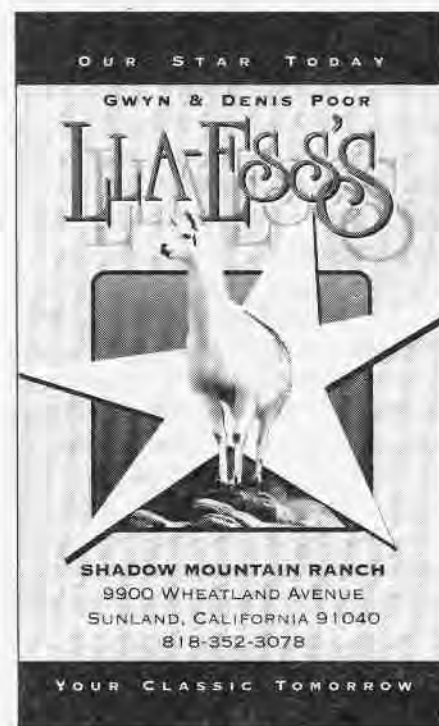
The horse folks came over to pet the llamas and enjoyed watching us jump our llamas into the trucks. We were thankful that nothing happened, and I am sure it might have, if it were

PAYMENTS TO RMLA OFFICERS

The proposed bylaw changes to our organization that were introduced at the September Conference caused obvious controversy. As I look back over the unfortunate conflict, I believe that most of the controversy resulted from a general misunderstanding by the membership of the recent growth and changes to RMLA.

From October 1989 to September 1990 the membership grew from approximately 350 to approximately 525. This is a 50% growth in 12 months. Incredible and great! With that growth came an inevitable increase in the administration workload, especially for the RMLA Secretary.

The day-to-day operations of our organization falls on the shoulders of the Secretary, and with over 500 members, that is quite a task. The telephone and mail chores are daily, not seasonal.

Over this past year, the RMLA officers kept records of their time commitments to the organization. The reason for such recordkeeping was to identify for future years how much effort was needed to perform the officer jobs. The Board agreed that it was vital to know the size of the tasks before asking members in the future to run for the offices.

SPEAK OUT, cont...

Well, the time requirements were documented, and they were surprisingly high for the secretary and treasurer. Specifically for the treasurer office, the time required is 4 to 5 hours weekly, and for secretary the time required is about 20 hours weekly. The documentation of these time commitments is what prompted President Scott Welles to push for the proposed \$1000 annual payment for the treasurer position, and the proposed \$4000 annual payment for the secretary position. Given the time efforts and the proposed two-year terms for each of the offices, the Board concurred in recommending these annual payments to the general membership vote.

Some unfair criticism has been leveled at Judi Lawson that she was requesting payment for her work as secretary. In point of fact, Judi never supported the proposal. She did not ask for any payment, did not vote in favor of the recommendation, and did not wish to have it presented as a bylaw change. Her reasoning was that she did not feel that our general membership would favor such a proposal. Looks like she was quite perceptive on that point.


The Board recommended the bylaw change over her opposition because the other Board members felt that it was unreasonable to ask members to volunteer 20 hours per week. Think about it carefully. 20 hours per week, every week. Who has that amount of time to donate?

RMLA is extremely fortunate that Judi was so generous with her time this past year. Incredibly, she is willing to serve another year as secretary. But, who is going to take over in

that position the following year when her turn ends? This is a very real problem, folks.

I am ambivalent on the subject of paying for the treasurer position. The less time commitments, as compared to the secretary, makes the decision less crucial, but of course, the arguments for payment are the same ones as for the secretary position. The importance of the position, the two-year term of office, the weekly time efforts, and the responsibilities all combine to produce a strong argument for some payment.

Perhaps the question of paying for RMLA work was thrown out to the membership too suddenly. A generally negative reaction occurred. Somewhat surprisingly, though, there was a generally positive reaction to the membership suggestion of hiring a business firm to perform the secretarial and treasurer functions. I personally would not be in favor of that. For one thing, basic control of the organization would switch to an outside firm. For another, the annual cost would certainly exceed the combined \$5000 proposed payments to our own officers.



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SPEAK OUT, cont...

Like many organizations, RMLA suffers from a lack of volunteers whenever office elections are held. It is crucial that good leaders step forward for the future. Continued growth and success of the organization depends on this. Perhaps offering at least small compensation would be helpful for the two most demanding positions.

Please think about the present situation, especially the following items:

1. Will you serve as an officer in the coming year(s)?
2. Do you know of someone who would be willing to serve as an officer? If so, will you encourage and support them?
3. How do you feel about paying for the positions of secretary and treasurer? Other positions?
4. How do you feel about paying an outside agency to perform the administrative functions?
5. How do you feel about 2-year terms for the positions of secretary and treasurer? Other positions?

YOUR THOUGHTS AND SUGGESTIONS WOULD BE VERY MUCH WELCOMED BY YOUR PRESENT BOARD.

A final thought is to urge you not to let personalities cloud your thinking. Any payments for secretary and treasurer will be effective for the NEXT officers to be elected in September, 1991. Candidates are obviously unknown at this point, but

assuredly there will be new faces in these positions. Think of the proposals in light of the job requirements, not in terms of individuals holding the offices.

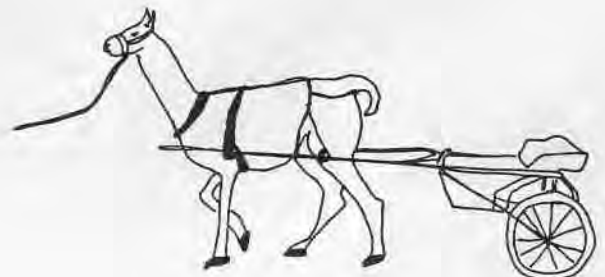
