**DESCRIPTION OF 1991
RMLA COMMITTEES**

FINANCE: Officer Liaison is Treasurer, Jerry Boudreaux.

The Finance Committee, composed of the Treasurer and four others, shall assist the Treasurer in preparation of an annual budget and such other activities as requested by the Executive Committee. Members, other than the Treasurer, shall constitute an Audit Board.

PERFORMANCE: Officer Liaison is President, Charlie Hackbarth. (Ad Hoc)

The Performance Committee shall organize and conduct llama performance events and promote the performance llama.

ELECTIONS: Officer Liaison is President, Charlie Hackbarth.

The Elections Committee shall recruit candidates and volunteers, and administer the election process.

WOOL: Officer Liaison is President-Elect Sally German (Ad Hoc).

The Wool Committee shall attend and/or conduct fiber-oriented events and promote the use of llama fiber.

NEWSLETTER: Officer Liaison is Vice-President, Dale Pettigrew.

The Newsletter Committee shall gather and disseminate information relevant to llamas and to the RMLA membership on a regular basis; they shall also staff the newsletter as necessary.

HERDSIRE: Officer Liaison is President Charlie Hackbarth (Ad Hoc).

The Herdsire Committee shall make available to interested RMLA members, a process by which studs can be traded for the purpose of affordable upgrading of small herds.

EDUCATION: Officer Liaison is President-Elect Sally German.

The Education Committee, composed of at least three members, shall be responsible for developing educational programs for the Association.

4-H & YOUTH: Officer Liaison is President-Elect Sally German.

The 4-H & Youth Committee shall develop a 4-H llama program.

BY-LAWS: Officer Liaison is President-Elect Sally German.

The By-Laws Committee shall review and update the by-laws as needed.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: Officer Liaison is Vice-President Dale Pettigrew.

The Public Relations, Marketing and Art Committee shall promote and stimulate member and public involvement in all sponsored events, as well as inform and educate the public on the diversified uses of llamas.

RMLA NEEDS INFORMATION ABOUT GUARD LLAMA EXPERIENCES by Doug Koss

For the last several months I have been trying to put together information regarding "The Use of Llamas For Predator Control." On most accounts I have found the llamas scored exceptionally well in protecting sheep from coyotes. However, I have heard many different ideas about the best way to introduce the llamas. Additionally, I found that we are without the necessary documentation to verify the accounts of the llamas' success! This information would prove beneficial in convincing authorities of the viability and success of guard llamas.

Getting together this data is important if we are to gain respect from the wool growers, or the state agencies that promote new ideas and strategies. I was recently surprised to find Colorado authorities ignorant about the use of llamas. Furthermore I became concerned as I listened to Jeff Green of the Colorado Extension Service. Jeff told me just before his talk on "Donkeys and Llamas For Predator Control" that he knew little about llamas. This was illustrated when he spent about three of the twenty minutes talking about llamas, and in that time said, "I had a llama owner call me regarding the best dog to guard their llamas. As far as llamas are concerned in protecting sheep, I will just let that stand on its own." His program included about fifteen slides of donkeys and one of llamas.

My idea is not to condemn Mr. Green, but to point out that we should look at providing the proper information to those that need it. There is a real need for quality information and proper documentation of experiences

that we have already had, and more quality research on the subject. If we are to provide llamas as guard animals, we need to know that to expect and how to best introduce the guard llama to the sheep.

Currently, I am trying to put together information regarding who has had experience in guard llama situations. This is so that we may work toward compiling the information that we currently have, and see how to best pursue any other information that might be necessary.

IOWA STATE INVESTIGATING USE OF LLAMAS AS GUARD ANIMALS FOR SHEEP

Coyote predation is one of the most important problems facing the sheep industry today. Predators cost sheep ranchers over \$83 million in products, which may discourage consumers from buying these products.

A variety of methods for controlling coyote predation have been tried, including shooting, poisoning, trapping, aversive conditioning, and toxic collars. Methods vary greatly in cost and do not always have the desired outcome. Environmental concern over the destruction of coyotes has led to the development of non-lethal predator control methods, such as electric fences, chemical repellants and guard animals.

Dr. William L. Franklin, professor of Animal Ecology at Iowa State University, and graduate assistant Kelly Powell are conducting a study of llama owners and their experiences in using llamas as guard animals for sheep. Both llamas and guanacos are instinctively aggressive towards canids, and will investigate, pursue, and even attack canid intruders.

Llamas are already being used by an estimated 100 to 150 ranchers in the U.S. because of their apparent effectiveness as guard animals. Llamas are herbivores that can be pastured with sheep without required daily feeding by the owner. This offers convenient 24 hour protection for the flock. Both the llama and guanaco are adaptable to a variety of environments and do not seem to require training.

Franklin and Powell will be interviewing sheep ranchers who have used,

or are using, llamas as guard animals. They invite interested parties, who have used guard llamas, or who know of another person who has, to contact them at the following address: Dr. William L. Franklin

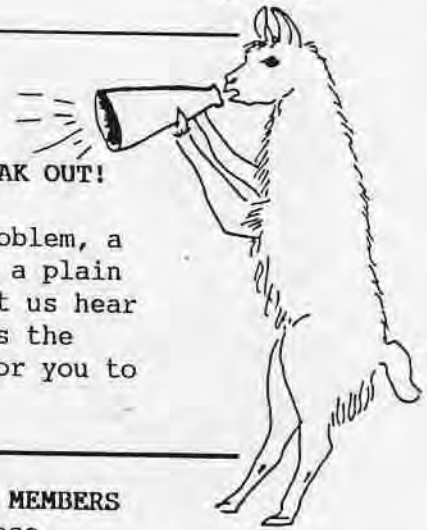

MOUNTAIN LIONS

This is the anniversary of the first attack of three by a mountain lion on our llamas. Many things led to the loss of more than one animal, mistakes on our part and on the part of the Division of Wildlife.

If you should ever be so unfortunate as to have a predator attack, first, **DO NOT MOVE THE DEAD ANIMAL.** The predator may return, allowing its capture. Second, you may hunt mountain lions with dogs. There are dog trackers who have clients with the proper licenses and permits who will gladly hunt the offending cat. Third, contact the Division of Wildlife immediately in the event that you are in an open area and are eligible for compensation.

If you live along the front range, you should check to see if your ranch is in a "Forbidden Firearms Discharge District" and, if so, the Division is not obligated to compensate for damages by game animals. If you are in such a district and have predators in the area, it is wise to house your animals at night, insure them and/or get guardian or guard dogs to fend off a potential predator. As abhorrent as it seems to many, allowing hunting on your property is a good way to get the message to predators that it is not a nice place to be!

SPEAK OUT, cont...

We live in a "FFDD" and have not been compensated by the Division of Wildlife. No, your tax dollars do not pay game damage claims; the fees collected from hunting and fishing licenses, permits, and fines support the Division. Those who have been in ranching know that the USDA has available predator hunters, as does the Division of Wildlife. It would behoove you to get in contact with them prior to a problem.

FOLLOWUP ON "POLITICAL PROWESS FOR THE LLAMA INDUSTRY"

We still do not have any, but we are working on it!

Dr. Tom Bunting of the ILA Board has been working with a group that could be very influential in helping the llama industry as a whole. Recently, Dr. Bunting made a presentation to the USAHA (U.S. Animal Health Association) annual meeting in Denver, using an 80 slide carousel of llamas. The idea was to let this organization, which has a great deal of influence over all livestock industries, know that llamas owners are alive and well--AND--take very good care of their animals. In addition, the presentation let them know the many uses of the llama.

The animal welfare committee meeting was where the talk was given, and according to Dr. Bunting, the group

was very impressed, both with the llama owner's care of his animals and the uses of llamas. Dr. Bunting stated in his letter to me that, "the spirit of cooperation and plans for cooperative research projects was begun."

Bob Russell, also of the ILA Board, and Stanlynn Dougherty is working with a special "Packing Committee" within ILA to investigate what steps are needed for llamas to be inserted into National Park and BLM regulations.

If you have had problems getting llama packing permits into your area, you may want to contact Bob or Stanlynn for updated information on the progress of this ILA committee. This newsletter will also keep you updated as much as possible.

Hey, it is a start, folks! We have to raise the consciousness of MANY political/government organizations of the value of llamas. More importantly we have to show that we refuse to be dominated by outdated rules and regulations, as well as old biases in favor of livestock other than llamas.

PERUVIAN HORSE CLUB ENTHUSIASTIC OVER LLAMA SHOW & SALE AT THEIR REGIONAL SHOW submitted by Judy Sealy

The following is a response of the Western Colorado Peruvian Horse Club to a llama show and sale coinciding with their regional show, June 21, 22, & 23, 1991 at Garfield County Fairgrounds, Rifle, Colorado:

The General Membership Meeting of the Western Colorado Peruvian Horse Club met on November 10, 1990 in Fruita, Colorado. Attending the meeting were Judy & Curt Sealy, Erma Hast, Sonja Anders, Ted & Fay Earley, and John Fitzgerald of the RMLA and Chickasaw (a llama). New business to be discussed included the presentation of the llamas and voting on the issue to include llamas and alpacas in their June, 1991 horse show. Following is an outline of the considerations of the Peruvian Horse Club:

PURPOSE: The Peruvian Horse Club is extending an invitation to us because they feel they are showing their breed to the same people over and over again each year. They would like to see some new faces at their show, and feel the llamas would bring in not only the llama participants but new and interested spectators as well. We must keep in mind, however, they are hosting this event and footing the bill for it. It is their show--llama people are being invited to participate and have a good time.

This would be an approved ALSA show and give us an extra opportunity each year to show our animals and earn points. It is with great hope that this becomes an annual event.

The schedule of events would be set up to keep the spectators interested at all times. For example, halter

classes would be held in one area, while something more active, like obstacles, in another. Virginia Christensen has been chosen to judge the llama and alpaca shows.

PLACE AND DATE: The dates of June 21, 22 & 23, 1991 were selected with Rifle County Fairgrounds winning the vote. Covered stalls will be available for the llama participants. Judges, veterinarian support and security are being discussed as well as events, ribbons, trophies and photographers.

FUN EVENTS: What's a show without a little fun! A costume parade is being considered. A lunch time snack may include a Kentucky Fried Chicken box lunch while we enjoy an interesting speaker. Opening day may include a llama driving demonstration or llama/people games. Saturday night includes a champagne party and all-you-can-eat BBQ with music, dancing, and entertainment provided at the showgrounds.


